
We wish you all our blessings and pray for you all as you face the future.

COME BYE, LOOK BACK, TAKE TIME, WALK ON A REFLECTION FOR



ADVENT BY RT REV PETER HILL ACTING BISHOP OF CHELMSFORD

Advent, which marks the start of the church year liturgically, will soon be upon us: but so very much has changed since last year due to the pandemic. How will we approach it this time

round, when the map of life is so altered, and Advent and Christmas 2020 will be different? Let me offer you a road map.

For many years I have practiced pilgrim prayer walking. It's one of the ways the Lord deals with me and sorts me out, sometimes profoundly. Several years ago, when I was pilgrim walking in Derbyshire, I came across a modern sculpture of a 'Companion Stone'.

Companion Stones were large upright stones or stoops, set up 300 years ago and more, to guide travellers across the treacherous moorland and marsh of the Derbyshire Peaks from one village to another. Modern sculptors have carved new ones for display across The Peaks, which hold other directions: not to the safety of the ancient villages, but for the sometimes equally perilous journey we all take through life. They are a sort of spiritual map.

The one I first came across at the head of the Padley Gorge had four directions carved on it: **come bye look back take time walk on.**

I offer you those directions as profitable for our extra demanding journey through the four weeks of Advent this year. They fit well with other more traditional Advent themes and will I believe take us all the way to the edge of Bethlehem by Christmas Eve.

Firstly, Advent is COMING BYE - stepping aside. It is stopping to catch our breath, taking rest and refreshment before carrying on with the journey. If life and work allow, I encourage you to first take 2 or 3 days out in some shape or form, to be rather than to do, to step back and ponder.

Advent is also LOOKING BACK - A time to consider the way God has saved us; the way God has called us and brought us. Look back in wonder at what God has done in Jesus for us all: The Word became flesh and dwelt among us (John 1:14). Look back in thanksgiving on your journey so far and recall what he has done in your life, what he has taught you, how he has honed and shaped you.

Advent is TAKING TIME - to look up in waiting upon God, to ask for his sight and

wisdom for the journey, for Jesus to speak into our situations. Faithful waiting is required in Advent. As Jesus said, 'Stand up and lift up your heads, because your redemption is near' (Luke 21:28).

Finally, Advent is WALKING ON, renewed in our anticipation and ready to serve, up for the next adventure with the One who loves us, knows what's best for us and wants to use us to extend his Kingdom. For me that Advent challenge to move on must be about seeking justice and well-being for all, and in doing so pointing people to Jesus. It is a constant theme of the prophecies in the book of Isaiah: learn to do good; seek justice, correct oppression; bring justice to the fatherless, plead the widow's cause (Isaiah 1:17).

What will that mean for me? What will that mean for you? What will that mean for us all by Christmas this year?

As someone has said, it is easier to be enraged by injustice half a world away than by a need half a street away. And let's not say we are too small or powerless to make a difference. As they say in Africa, if you think you're too small to be effective, you've never been to bed with a mosquito!

When we do get to Bethlehem this year, we will once again peek inside that stable door and kneel at the manger of him who threw stars into space. We will hear again his costly call to bring in his Kingdom of justice and kindness. As the letter to Titus reminds us, the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people (Titus 2:11)

So this Advent, in this extraordinary year, I encourage us all to come bye, look back, take time, and then walk on to serve our Lord Jesus afresh. That's how we get to Bethlehem this Christmas
